What is our Vision?

Recently, a large gathering of members were challenged to dream big and think of what they would like to see at St. Paul's in ten years. Some ideas were ministry benchmarks and school body related, and some were physical and practical. In the end, we can't do them all right away, but we can start to re-energize the body of Christ by working on those necessary upgrades to the campus that benefit younger families and the elderly, and also foster a more inspiring environment and first impression for visitors and potential members.

Among those material items are:

- An atrium entryway to the Narthex that includes more bright Fellowship space, a covered drop-off area at the entrance, and new and safer handicapped parking and school drop-off areas, demonstrating that everyone counts and each individual's relationship stems from what happens in the sanctuary.
- Upgraded interior Fellowship area renovation with more efficient use of space, inviting furniture, better **lighting** and artistic focal features, access from the Prayer Garden, while paying homage to the most-loved historic pieces from our past; renovated main restrooms are included. Reorganizing entryways, environments, and Fellowship possibilities underscores the value of relationships we have in Christ to old and new friends.
- An outdoor chapel/pavilion with firepit to expand our use of the grounds, connect the church and school ministries internally and connect St. Paul's as a whole to the **community** with an attractive and useful space for ministry to youth, school, and families.







• Reimbursement to the Endowment for the recent necessary updating of the HVAC as responsible stewardship of the building we inherited and hope to bequeath to the next generation in healthy and beautiful condition.

The target goal is \$1.5 million which is both feasible and challenging. In the end, we actively and earnestly pray that God uses the campaign to bless the church family at St. Paul's with expanded evangelism and discipleship, increasing the body of Christ in church and school. The physical changes to the campus will mean little without a rededication to the Gospel and changing the hearts of her members.





Rededicating to the true reality of what goes on here is something that goes way beyond brick and mortar. The building enables our mission much like a house enables a family. This place was dedicated to the proclamation of the kingdom, the preaching of Christ crucified and risen, and the teaching of all generations to the very end of the age. When we take to heart the meaning and purpose of the place we naturally want it to thrive. We want the next generation to get from us what we got from those who came before us.

Rededicating ourselves and this place to the mission of the Gospel means working to make the ministry here sustainable, accessible, and inviting. We want the physical plant not only to be well-maintained but improved upon in hopes of facilitating congregational growth that we pass off to the next generation. We want everything we do here to be accessible to as many people as possible, including those who have difficulty getting around. We want to connect to our community with as welcoming and caring an environment as we can possibly provide.

Rededicating to this church and school ministry is especially important at a time when the society around us is wandering away from God's Word and His ways. But along with that added importance comes the added difficulty of doing something counter-cultural. But we need not fear because God has given us the wherewithal to do whatever He calls us to do.

God rededicates Himself to us day after day and week after week. That's why this place exists. We have been formed by the ministry here, and we want the same for the next generation. By God's grace we hope that forty years from now faithful Christian people here in Munster are rededicating St. Paul's again.
